The old Holbrook Pond and its environs, according to Government plans and engineers promises will be turned into one of the most beautiful lake and garden spots in the state. ## IMPROVEMENTS IN TOWN ROADS MADE

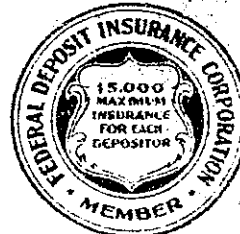
